

Did you know?

Roald Dahl could not find anyone to publish Charlie and the Chocolate Factory for years.

He used to get in trouble at school and was told off a lot. Some people think that he based the character of Mrs Trunchbull in Matilda on one of his old teachers. He didn't enjoy school. He didn't like following rules and wanted to travel to other countries instead.

After finishing school, he went to many different places like Canada and Africa. He flew planes in the Second World War and was badly injured in a crash in Egypt.

After the crash, he moved to America and started writing. When he started, he didn't write children's books. He wrote stories for newspapers and magazines. At this time, he married his wife, Patricia Neal.

Did you know?

Roald Dahl helped to write the film, Chitty Chitty Bang Bang.



Roald Dahl loved telling his children bedtime stories and these bedtime stories gave him the ideas for his children's books. His first published children's book was James and the Giant Peach, which was published in 1961. After this, every book he wrote was successful. Most of his books have been made into films.

Roald Dahl sadly died on the 12th of November in 1990. He was 74 years old when he died. In his lifetime, he wrote 19 children's books.

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Tasmanian Devil

The Tasmanian devil can only be found in the wild in Tasmania, Australia. The Tasmanian devil is a marsupial.



Female marsupial animals have pouches in

which they carry their young. The pouch helps the Tasmanian devil mother to feed and protect newly born babies. There are four teats in the pouch, so she can look after four little devils at one time.

> Tasmanian devils are mostly black, but usually have white markings on their bottom or the chest. Tasmanian devils are carnivore, which means they only eat meat. They are also known to be scavengers. They eat lizards, frogs, insects and any animal meat they can find.

The Tasmanian devil stores fat in its tail so that it has something to draw on when there isn't a lot of food to eat. Their eyesight is better when it's dark. They are good at spotting things that are moving, but if things are still they probably won't see it as clearly. Male devils are usually bigger than females. They are about 30 centimetres tall and weigh up to 14kg.

Did you know...? Devils can eat up to 40% of their body weight in a day.









All About Pythons

Pythons are snakes. Snakes are reptiles. They have cold blood and scales. Some snakes are as small as a coin while others are as long as a school bus! They are excellent swimmers. The can live to be 40 years old.

Pythons like to live in warm places, such as deserts and rainforests. They hide in trees or under rocks and leaves on the ground. Pythons have patterned skin which helps them blend in with nature.

Pythons eat small animals like rats and lizards. Some pythons are so big they can eat larger animals. Pythons will hide and wait for small animals to pass. They jump out quickly to catch their prey, squeeze the animals, and then swallow them whole.





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



Nocturnal Animals

What Is a Nocturnal Animal?

Nocturnal animals are mostly active at night and sleep during the day. Many of them have an excellent sense of smell and very good hearing. Some nocturnal animals also have special eyesight. These extra strong senses make it easier for them to hunt, but it also means they can see predators more easily. Animals that are active during the

day and sleep at night are called diurnal.

Seeing in the Dark

Some animals, like cats, have eyes that adapt to seeing in both the day and night. However, many nocturnal animals have specially adapted eyes. Many people think that bats are blind but they can actually see almost as well as humans. However, at night, their hearing

is more important to them. This is because bats use a special sense called echolocation to help them navigate at night. The bats make sounds and when the sound hits an object, it makes an echo. Bats then use this to judge how close they are to things. Owls have very large eyes compared to the size of their bodies which helps them to see well in the dark.


Nocturnal Animals in the UK

In the UK, nocturnal animals can be found in many places, including woodlands, towns, fields and parks. These animals include badgers, foxes, owls, bats and hedgehogs.



Nocturnal Animals

Some nocturnal animals are protected because there are too few of them in the wild. This means they are endangered. In the UK, hedgehogs are endangered. This is because their natural habitats are being destroyed by things such as pollution and construction work. It is important to look after natural habitats so that these animals can thrive.




Did You Know?




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Hedgehogs



^e Hedgehogs can be found almost everywhere in the UK. They live in cities and towns, and can be found on railway land, parks and gardens. They do not live on mountainsides because there is not much food for them and there are not many places for them to nest.

What do they look like?

Hedgehogs are small, spiky animals. Their babies are called hoglets. Adult hedgehogs have long spines along their backs and sides, but not on their faces or legs. Some hedgehogs can have up to seven thousand spines!

What do they eat?

Hedgehogs are often called the Gardener's Friend because they eat the slugs that eat plants and cause damage to the garden. Gardeners are usually pleased to see a hedgehog.

If you want a hedgehog to visit your garden, you could leave a small saucer of cat or dog food out as they like the meat. Make sure that you leave a saucer of water out too, especially in the summer months.



No milk for hedgehogs!

Milk makes hedgehogs very poorly so don't leave it out for them.

Hedgehog Habits

Hedgehogs visit a lot of gardens. You could have as many as 10 different hedgehogs passing through your garden! They are very nosey animals, and sometimes need rescuing from getting their heads stuck in empty yoghurt pots, tins and plastic cups.

Helping a Hedgehog

There are some things you can do to keep a visiting hedgehog safe if they pass through your garden.



When a hedgehog feels scared, it will roll itself up into a ball so that its spikes will frighten off its enemies.

Slug pellets – Never use these to kill slugs. Hedgehogs eat the pellets or the dead slugs and the poison in them can kill the hedgehogs.

Garden ponds – Hedgehogs can fall into ponds and drown. Make sure your pond has sloping sides so a hedgehog can get out to safety if they fall in. You could also cover the pond with netting or chicken wire.



Hedgehogs hibernate between November and the middle of March, so be extra careful if moving piles of leaves during this time.

Nesting places – Hedgehogs nest in piles of leaves, so if you are planning to tidy the garden, be careful you don't accidentally wake a sleeping hedgehog.

hibernate – to sleep all through the cold winter months until the springtime. slug pellets – poisonous tablets left out in the garden to kill slugs.




