## Nouns plural (more than one)

Nouns can be singular (one only) or plural (more than one). To make most nouns plural add $s$ at the end of them, eg gardens, chairs, cups, papers, girls. However there are some exceptions.

Other general rules for making words plural

| Words ending in: | Rule | Examples | Exceptions |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| words that end in e | add s | houses, games, tables |  |
| words that end in oo | add s | cuckoos, igloos, zoos |  |
| words that end in ch, <br> sh, s, ss or x | add es | churches, glasses, <br> foxes, dishes |  |
| words that end in o | add es | tomatoes, heroes, <br> volcanoes | photos, pianos, <br> radios, kilos |
| words that end in a <br> vowel and y (eg ay, <br> ey, oy ) | add s | keys, boys, monkeys |  |

## Other interesting plurals

| some words remain the same <br> for singular and plural | sheep, bread, weather, paper, <br> grapefruit, information |  |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| some words are always plural | trousers, scissors, tweezers, <br> politics, riches, police, news |  |
| some words have a different <br> form for the plural | tooth - teeth, mouse - mice, <br> woman - women, man - men, <br> child - children |  |
| compound nouns usually have <br> the base word as a plural | handbags, brothers-in-law, <br> runners-up, lookers-on | cupfuls, spoonfuls, bucketfuls |
